Our literature and reading curriculum provides a range of reading experiences from classic texts to contemporary fiction and non-fiction. We are committed to encouraging students to read widely and deeply and to think critically about literature and the world through writing, discussion, and exploration.

To this end, all 9th and 10th grade students should read books that challenge them and allow them to explore their interests during the summer months. Students will be expected to share their responses to their selected summer reading texts during their English courses next school year.

- Students in **honors-level** courses should select at least **one fiction** and **one nonfiction** text from the lists and resources provided.
- Students in **college prep level** should select at least **one book** of their choice from the lists and resources provided.



FICTION recommendations




All My Rage by Sabaa Tahir:

Project Hail Mary by Andy Weir:


Ryland Grace wakes up on a spaceship with no memory, where he soon learns that he is the sole survivor on a desperate mission to save the earth.


Kneel by Candice Buford:


Reality is Broken by Jane McGonigal


Blood, Bullets, and Bones by Bridget Heos:


