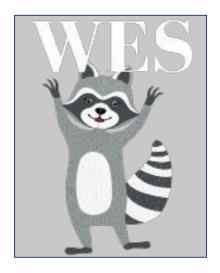

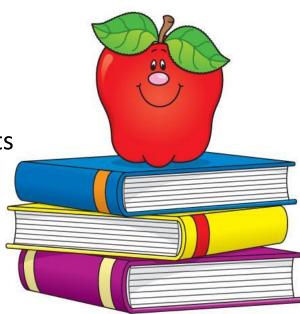

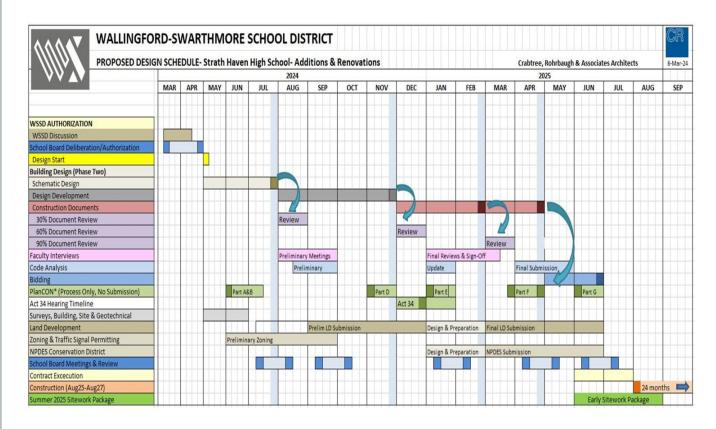

If the district were to borrow **\$60M** in new debt we would need to increase debt service in the budget by \$557,652 per year for five consecutive years.

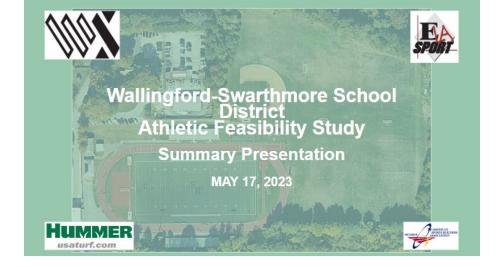
If the district were to borrow **\$40M** in new debt we would need to increase debt service in the budget by \$373,497 per year for five consecutive years.

If the district were to borrow **\$20M** in new debt we would need to increase debt service in the budget by \$241,216 per year for five consecutive years.

#### **PROJECT GOALS**

To develop a comprehensive master plan for WSSD's athletic fields and facilities that will:

- ~ Identify the proper number of fields and facilities needed to accommodate current and future athletic programs.
- ~ Identify design concerns with WSSD facilities.
- ~ Account for equity amongst facilities, in accordance with Title IX
- ~ Identify potential safety issues with the fields and facilities and establish budgets to address those items.
- ~ Establish a phased approach to the recommendations.
